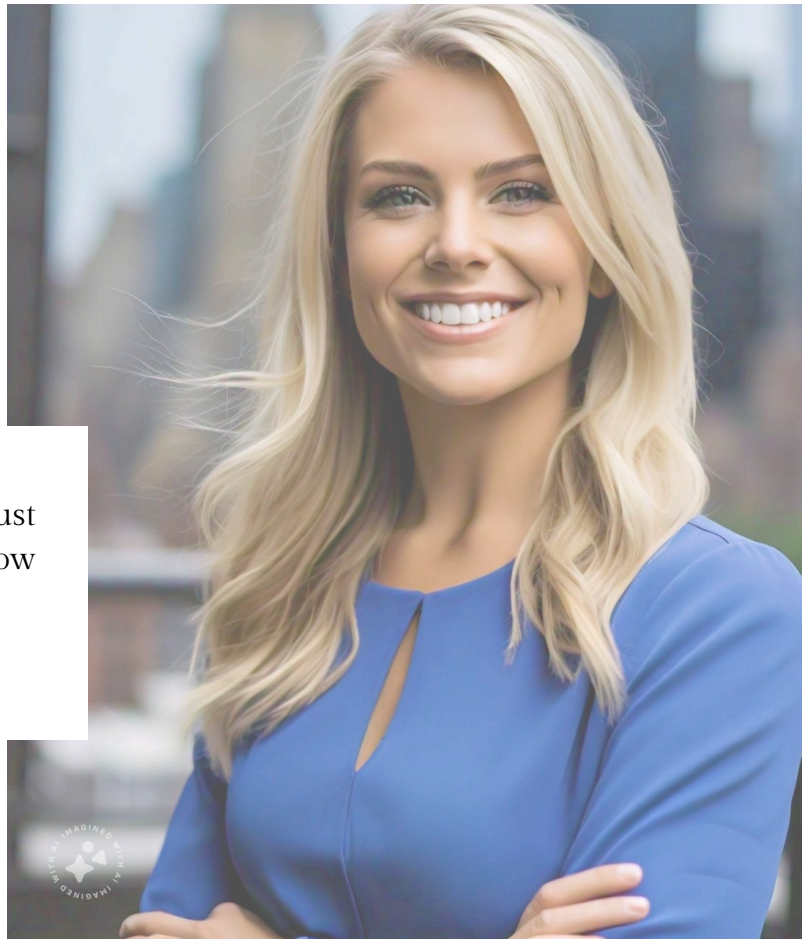


# MASTERING YOUR IMAGE: THE POWER OF PROFESSIONAL PRESENCE

- **Flower Power:** Florals lend femininity but need careful management in the workplace. A subtle floral blouse is appropriate, while a flowy floral dress is better for the weekend.
- **Who Let the Leopard Loose?:** Animal prints, especially leopard, are trendy but require moderation and realism. Stick to natural colors and avoid anything overly flashy.
